The highly acclaimed British born classical guitarist Alison Smith has been described as one of the most exciting and lyrical guitarists to emerge in recent years. In 1995 Alison graduated with honours from Trinity College of Music, London. She is also a teacher of the colourstring method and has been an advisor and examiner for colourstring centres in London and Dublin.
